This has been a year of reckoning for the United States as we grapple with the long-term effects of racism and White supremacy. Recently, we witnessed the murder of eight people of Asian descent in Atlanta in a year of mounting racist and xenophobic violence against Asians, Asian-Americans, and Pacific Islanders. Additionally, murders across the country in many communities seem to be a part of our zeitgeist. Tulane's community has not been untouched by this violence; there have been reports of overt harassment as well as myriad microaggressions. We are, and have been, committed to doing the work to form a better, more inclusive community and to address the racism we find within ourselves.

How do we break this futile cycle? How do we move beyond the siloed interpretations and judgments that have limited our ability to address the disparities that are sewn into the fabric of our nation? Perhaps it starts with humility and the need to check the privileges and assumptions that are so ingrained that we rarely perceive them. The next step is likely conversation and humble listening about our challenges, transgressions and opportunities. Hopefully, those conversations will result in a call to action for both our leaders and ourselves. Our next challenge will be to hold our leaders and each other accountable for the changes in approach, attitude and action that will be necessary to achieve the "liberty and justice for all" that we espouse in our university communications.

The Office of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (OGPS) stands ready to participate in the tough conversations that are ahead of our campus community, both as speaker and as a humble listener. We look forward to partnering with students, postdocs, faculty, alumni and community members as we identify actions needed to effect the change that is needed on our campus and beyond. We invite you to hold us accountable as we do our part to work towards that change.

These conversations, however, are not new. Much of the recent strategizing about solutions to unite campus constituents started in earnest in 1987 when Carolyn Barber-Pierre joined the Tulane community to start the Office of Minority Affairs. Ms. Barber-Pierre's tenure includes her current position as the Assistant Vice President and Director of Multicultural Affairs, to other titles such as the director of the Office of Minority Affairs (renamed in 1988 the Office of Multicultural Affairs), and leader of the "O". Today, we celebrate the next evolution of work under Ms. Barber-Pierre's leadership with opening of the Carolyn Barber-Pierre Center for Intercultural Life, which includes the Office of Multicultural Affairs, The Office for Gender and Sexual Diversity, and Religious Life. The Center's work is multifaceted and provides space for students to develop their identities around race and culture, sexuality and gender diversity, and spirituality while also working on campus-wide initiatives. These initiatives have included creating a space for students to work with the university to address issues of bias and discrimination as well as work led by the Center to focus on community engagement and diversity, equity, and inclusion. Graduate students are important to the Center for Intercultural Life (CIL). Individual graduate students serve in leadership roles within the Center. Programming efforts include reaching out all undergraduates, graduate and professional students on a weekly basis such as Wednesdays at the "O" and campus-wide receptions for graduate and professional students. A key value of the CIL is to foster a basis for the university community that promotes respect and appreciation for racial, ethnic, religious, gender and sexual diversity as well as the history, traditions, and cultures of underrepresented student populations. OGPS is honored to be a collaborator with the CIL to further promote and respect the experiences of graduate students. We also celebrate Ms. Barber-Pierre's legacy and work by highlighting and congratulating the new CIL space in Richardson Hall, located on the uptown campus's Gibson quad. This new location is centrally situated for programming efforts for all our students. Congratulations Ms. Carolyn Barber-Pierre and thank you for being a campus pacesetter!
