A message from Associate Provost for Graduate Studies and Research Michael Cunningham -

Like many of you, I am exhausted, anxious, and unsure of what the "new normal" will be as we make plans to come back to campus. I am exhausted in realizing that the color of my skin and my assigned gender can be seen as threatening and weaponized. I am anxious as we embark on a life associated with trauma, tragedy and too many deaths associated with COVID-19. I am unsure of the new normal. Although I must plan, I am unsure if my plans will come to fruition. The combination of a world health pandemic and heightened racism in the U.S. has left me with more questions than answers. My exhaustion is heightened by the recent events of killings of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery and Breonna Taylor and many more. These few examples are the latest in what feels like an unending assault on the lives of African Americans. This perceived assault is exacerbated by Christian Cooper's experience in Central Park, which illuminates the sense of privilege and superiority that impinges on liberty and underscores much of the violence that has been meted out against African Americans. These events, and far too many others beforehand, are the latest chapter of the series of injustice, racism, and violence against Black lives that continues to persist within the United States.

But how do I turn my exhaustion into hope and action? First, on behalf of the Office of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (OGPS), I acknowledge the pain, frustration, and trauma that too many members of our Tulane community are feeling. Second, I reaffirm our unwavering commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. Collectively, we unequivocally condemn the continued violence against Black individuals as well as others, regardless of race, ethnicity, faith, nationality, sexual orientation, gender identity or the intersectional combinations that make us who we are. We join in the many vigorous calls for justice and change. Please know we remain here to support you and will not remain silent under any grievous or egregious circumstances that may arise. Racism, bigotry, and hate have no place within Tulane University, New Orleans, Louisiana, and the nation. I may not have answers to all of your questions, but I am willing to work with you and to make sure that Tulane is a welcoming and supportive place to learn, grow, and advance scholarship that can make a difference in the lives of all.

Fall Postdoctoral Travel Award Applications Due July 15

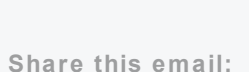
